**WHAT THIS CHAPTER IS, IN PLAIN ENGLISH**

Your child is learning to STUDY INDIAN SOCIETY systematically using sociological tools. They learn (1) the sociological imagination — the skill of connecting personal experiences to social structures (e.g., unemployment isn't just a personal failure; it's a public issue), (2) the many dimensions of Indian diversity (22 languages, 8 religions, thousands of castes, varied regions, gender variations), (3) how British colonialism (1757-1947) transformed Indian society — not just economically but administratively, socially, educationally, and psychologically, and (4) how the modern Indian nation-state was forged from this colonial inheritance.

**5 QUESTIONS TO ASK YOUR CHILD**

- What is the sociological imagination? Give an example.
- Discuss the impact of colonialism on Indian society.
- Describe the dimensions of diversity in India.
- Name three Indian sociologists and one contribution each.
- Why is studying Indian society important?

**WEAK-SPOT INDICATORS**

- Treats sociological imagination as 'imagining society'.
- Cannot cite Mills (1959) as the originator.
- Reduces colonialism to economic impact only.
- Lists 2-3 dimensions of diversity instead of 5-6.
- Mixes up Srinivas's concepts (Sanskritisation vs dominant caste).
